Please do your part to protect Wisconsin's great fishing from the VHS virus and other invasive species threats by following these simple steps:

DRAIN all water from your boat, PWC, motor, bilge, live wells, and fishing equipment including bait buckets and coolers before leaving the lake or shoreline.



TAKE NO LIVE FISH or fish eggs, including unused bait minnows, from these waters. Ice your catch and dispose of your minnows into covered waste barrels.



BUY MINNOWS LOCALLY from licensed Wisconsin bait dealers.



INSPECT and REMOVE all aquatic plants, animals, and mud from your boat, trailer, and equipment before leaving the landing.
